(from page 1) was visiting the United States and learned of this new custom started by Ms. Michael. When she returned to France she made artificial red poppies to raise money for war orphaned children and widowed women. This tradition spread to other countries. In 1921, the Franco-American Children’s League sold poppies nationally to benefit war orphans of France and Belgium. The League disbanded a year later and Madam Guerin approached the VFW for help. Shortly before Memorial Day in 1922 the VFW became the first veterans’ organization to nationally sell poppies. Two years later their ‘Buddy’ Poppy program was selling artificial poppies made by disabled veterans. In 1948 the US Post Office honored Ms. Michael for her role in founding the National Poppy movement by issuing a red 3 cent postage stamp with her likeness on it.” In 2000, a government resolution was passed to promote a ‘National Moment of Remembrance’ for our fallen soldiers. The designated time for the remembrance is 3:00pm local time, throughout our country. This moment was designated “to voluntarily and informally observe in their own way a Moment of Remembrance and Respect, pausing from whatever they are doing for a moment of silence or listening to ‘Taps’.” This practice is a commendable way for us to join with many others in a concrete act of honoring and remembering our fallen soldiers. I encourage all our parishioners to make time for Holy Mass on Memorial Day. Please see in this bulletin the various times for Holy Mass! Through the intercession of Mary, the Queen of Heaven, St. Joseph, St. Michael and St. Paul, may God bless all our parishioners and, in a special way, all those serve our country as soldiers, police, fire fighters, and emergency responders! From Father Kasel

Praised be Jesus Christ through Mary!
Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,
This Monday is Memorial Day. This is a very special day during which we honor and remember our fellow Americans who gave their lives fighting on behalf of our Nation. It is difficult to know the greatness of the debt we owe to our fallen soldiers. We have many freedoms, privileges and blessings that we enjoy on a daily basis because of their choice to sacrifice their lives. The least we can do, I think, is to understand Memorial Day better and to pray for our brothers and sisters who sacrificed so much for us. Here is a brief history of this day taken from www.usmemorialday.org:
“Memorial Day started off as a somber day of remembrance; a day when Americans went to cemeteries and placed flags or flowers on the graves of our war dead. It was a day to remember ancestors, family members, and loved ones who gave the ultimate sacrifice. But now, too many people “celebrate” the day without more than a casual thought to the purpose and meaning of the day. How do we honor the 1.8 million that gave their life for America since 1775? How do we thank them for their sacrifice? We believe Memorial Day is one day to remember.
Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in service of the United States of America. Over two dozen cities and towns claim to be the birthplace of Memorial Day. While Waterloo N.Y. was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon Johnson in May 1966, it’s difficult to prove conclusively the origins of the day. Regardless of the exact date or location of its origins, one thing is clear – Memorial Day was borne out of the Civil War and a desire to honor our dead. It was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11. “The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land,” he proclaimed. The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn’t the anniversary of any particular battle. On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers buried there.
The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days until after World War I (when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war). It is now celebrated in almost every state on the last Monday in May with Congressional passage of the National Holiday Act of 1971...
In 1915, inspired by the poem “In Flanders Fields,” Moina Michael replied with her own poem: *We cherish too, the Poppy red, That grows on fields where valor led, It seems to signal to the skies, That*

blood of heroes never dies. She then conceived of an idea to wear red poppies on Memorial day in honor of those who died serving the nation during war. She was the first to wear one, and sold poppies to her friends and co-workers with the money going to benefit servicemen in need. Later a Madam Guerin from France (continued on page 4)

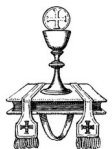

Holy Spirit Novena: This month, instead of the novena beginning on June 1 as usual, please pray it from Friday, May 30, to Saturday, June 7, in preparation for the Solemnity of Pentecost on June 8.

Follow the Path of Our Lord
“If anyone wishes to come after Me, let him deny himself, take up his Cross and follow Me. The Lord’s command seems difficult and painful: that anyone who wishes to follow Him must deny himself. But His command is not really difficult or painful, since He Himself helps us to do what He commands. For the verse of the psalm addressed to Him was truly spoken: *Because of the words of Your lips I have abided by hard ways.* True also are His own words: *My yoke is mild and My burden is light.* For Love makes easy whatever is difficult in His commands. What does it mean, *let him take up his own cross*? It means he must endure many things that are painful; that is the way he must follow Me. When he begins to follow Me in my life and My teachings, many will contradict him, try to stop him, or dissuade him, even those who call themselves Christ’s disciples. It was they who walked with Christ that tried to stop the blind men from calling out to Him. So if you wish to follow Christ, you will take these threats of flattery or any kind of obstacle and fashion them into the Cross; you must endure it, carry it, and not give way under it. And so in this world that is the Church, a world of the good, the reconciled, and the saved, or rather, those destined for salvation, but already saved by Hope, as it is written, by Hope we are saved, in this world of the Church, which completely follows Christ, He has said to everyone: *If anyone wishes to follow Me, let him deny himself.* This is not a command for virgins to obey and brides to ignore, for widows and not for married women, for monks and not for married men, or for the clergy and not for the laity. No, the whole Church, the entire body, all the members in their distinct and varied functions, must follow Christ. She who is totally unique, the dove, the spouse who was redeemed and dowered by the Blood of her Bridegroom, is to follow Him. There is a place in the Church for the chastity of the virgin, for the continence of the widow, and for the modesty of the married. Indeed, all her members have their place, and this is where they are to follow Christ, in their function and in their way of life. They must deny themselves, that is, they must not presume on their own strength. They must take up their Cross by enduring in the world for Christ’s sake whatever pain the world brings. Let them love Him who alone can neither deceive nor be deceived, who alone will not fail them. Let them love Him because His promises are True. Faith sometimes falters because He does not reward us immediately. But hold out, be steadfast, endure, bear the delay, and you have carried the Cross.” (From a sermon by St. Augustine, Bishop)

Archdiocesan Passport Adventure: We are 175 years strong!
Catholics around the world are marking 2025 as a Year of Jubilee, while at the same time we as an Archdiocese celebrate 175 years since our founding on July 19, 1850. Archbishop Hebda invites you to become an Archdiocesan Jubilee Pilgrim:

- Go to <https://www.archspm.org/passport/> for more information and to download and print your passport.
- From now through Sunday, October 12, try to visit seven parishes other than your own, much as Saint Philip Neri led the faithful of his day to seven churches in Rome. You could pray for one of the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit at each church.
- Among the seven churches, try to visit our two Jubilee co-cathedral churches: the Cathedral of Saint Paul and the Basilica of Saint Mary. Look for the Jubilee Cross in each of them.
- Perhaps visit our oldest Church of Saint Peter in Mendota and one of our newest churches. Saint Katherine Drexel in Ramsey is just about to be consecrated and St. Elizabeth Ann Seton in Hastings has just been renovated.
- Try to participate in a Mass that might expand your personal experience of liturgy—perhaps with our Maronite or Byzantine brothers and sisters, with one of our immigrant communities, with one of our Traditional Latin Mass communities, with the Catholic deaf community or with the University students at Saint Lawrence in Dinkytown.
- Join us **Sunday, October 12** for one of the morning Masses at the Cathedral and for an Ice Cream Social.
